MUSEUM OPENS EXHIBIT TO THE PUBLIC



For the first time in four years the Horn Museum is now open for the public with regular visiting hours. There are several unfinished display projects, but since these projects will not be completed for sometime, it was decided to allow visitation of our display while finishing the remaining

projects as soon as possible.

The main obstacle in the completion of three projects in the exhibition area is the lack of finances. Twenty thousand dollars is needed to commission eleven murals which were originally designed as illustrative examples of the use of the artifacts on display. Space has been reserved in the display area and several artists have been contacted, but insufficient funds have forced us to delay this project.

In addition, funds are needed to develop our "Coin and Tablet Room." As you know, the Horn Museum has over 3,000 cuneiform tablets in its collection, but the display area is limited. The museum also has an

exceptional coin collection, with only a few coins on display. We do have an excellent room in which both the coins and tablets can be displayed; however, \$5,000 is needed to develop this display

The third area needing attention is the purchase of additional objects for display. The new exhibit encompasses the Stone Age through Islamic times; unfortunately, in some of the periods, we have a very limited number of objects. About \$5,000 is needed to fill in the "gaps."

We will keep our readers informed of our progress. As we near completion of these projects we will be planning a "Grand opening" and we want you to be

there.

THE 1986/1987 LECTURE SERIES

The Horn Museum lecture series began on Oct. 13 with Dr. Abraham Terian's presenting, "The Religious Relics of the First Christian Nation." Dr. Terian, Professor of Intertestamental and Early Christian Literature at Andrews University, was recently invited by the Soviet Academy of Sciences to lecture in Soviet Armenia. Dr. Terian's lecture at Andrews University provided a survey of Christian Armenian history and outlined the research potential for those competent in Armenia.

Dr. Bjornar Storfjell, Director of the Institute of Archaeology at Andrews University, presented on Oct. 27, "The Crescent and the Cross: Christianity Gives Way to Islam." This lecture detailed the transition between the Byzantine culture and emerging Islamic influences. Historical details were highlighted by archaeological evidence.

The Director and Dean of the Fransican Biblical Institute Stanislao Loffreda lectured on Nov 17. Dr. Loffreda, who is also the Director of the Capernaum Excavation, presented "Recent Excavations at Capernaum." This well-attended lecture
